## THE FORGOTTEN ALASKA-CLASS

NOT A BATTLECRUISER NOR A BATTLESHIP, THESE TWO LARGE CRUISERS WENT INTO SERVICE
AFTER THE OPPOSING ENEMY SHIPS HAD ALL BEEN DEFEATED

oday, two of the least known
World War Two US Navy
warships were the USS Alaska
(CB-1) and USS Guam (CB-2). Even
the 1930s' isolationist US Congress
could see that both Germany and
Japan had the intention of world
domination. This could lead to the
possibility of America fighting a world
war by itself if our nation's numerous
Allies were

all destroyed by the growing military power of these two dictatorships. Within that decade, a few small naval appropriation bills were passed but it took the surrender of France after being overrun in just six weeks combined with Japan threatening American Pacific possessions for the government to finally act.

On 19 July 1940, the Vinson-Walsh Act was passed and this was better known as the Two-Ocean Navy
Act — the bill would provide ships for
the US Navy to fight wars in both the
Pacific and the Atlantic. Immediately
increasing the size of the US Navy
by 70%, the Two-Ocean Navy
Act authorized construction
of 257 ships and included
the construction of 18
aircraft carriers,

new battleships and six *Alaska*-class cruisers and these last ships form the basis of this story.

Changing tactics and the devastating Japanese sneak attack on Pearl Harbor would result that of all the newly-authorized or under construction battleships for the Navy, only four *Iowa*-class battleships and four *South Dakota*-class battleships would see completion. None of the *Montana*-class battleships would be completed. This left the six authorized *Alaska*-class large cruisers along with

the problem of what to do with the ships.

With the construction of the new fast carrier task forces, the role of the large cruiser was to protect them against
