keel of its first super carrier, the conventional-powered USS Forrestal (CVA-59). Built by Newport News Shipyard, Forrestal was launched in December 1954 and commissioned on 1 October 1955 at Norfolk, Virginia, Forrestal was the first US carrier to be built with an angled deck and four catapults, thus allowing landings and launchings to take place simultaneously. She also had no deck elevator, having instead four deck edge elevatorse

n 1952, the US Navy laid the

Forrestal made her first overseas deployment in 1955 when she joined the 6th Fleet in the Mediterranean. Between 1955 and 1983, Forrestal would make 17 overseas deployments serving with the 6th Fleet and with the 7th Fleet off the coast of Vietnam. Between 1983 and 1985, she was at the Philadelphia Navy Yard undergoing a Service Life Extension Program (SLEP)



Forrestal's ship insignia contained the silhouette of James Forrestal the first Secretary of Defense for whom she was named. The ship's motto "First in Defense" is a play on Forrestal being the first Secretary of Defense.
