WAR, SURPLUS VICTORY SHIP

Named after the town of Silverbow. Montana, the ship that would later become Permanente Silverbow was ordered by the US Maritime Commission (USMC) during World War II as USMC Hull 108. She was laid down at the Oregon Shipbuilding Corporation's ways in Portland (coincidentally owned by Henry J. Kaiser's Kaiser Shipbuilding Co.) as

Yard number 1024, on 11 April 1944, as a VC2-S-AP3 ship, more commonly referred to as "Victory Ships." The AP3 is a general cargo carrier with a displacement of 7629 tons, is 455-feet long, 62-feet wide at the beam, and draws 28 feet when fully loaded. The ship featured five holds, capable of carrying 523,740 cubic feet of cargo, and could steam, at full speed (17 knots or 19.56 mph), for 51 days or 20,000 miles. Oregon Shipbuilding constructed 99 of the 141 VC2-S-AP3 types built during the war.

Hull 108 was christened Silverbow Victory and launched on 23 May, just 42

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
